Training and Counseling on HIV/AIDS and Domestic Violence Project

### I. CURRENT STATUS AND PROGRESS

During the month of December the organization received funds as was prepared on the cash flow register to implement the planned activities as stated on the work-plan tool. The situation with the training of 10 hotline counselors was scheduled to be done during this month, but due the unavailability of the number of applicants this activity is rescheduled to be done early in 2009.

#### **Planned Activities**

Planned activities included:

### 1. Behavioural Change Communication through One-on-One Community Outreach

- (1) Face to face counseling
- (2) Client questionnaire analysis (feedback from clients using the client's questionnaire forms)
- (3) Referrals
- (4) Hotline counseling
- (5) Court support and counseling (in school youth)

#### 2. A & B prevention program

- (1) ISY-Prevention A the conduct of abstinence messages to youths in 3 secondary schools in Region 4
- (2) OSY Prevention A & B the conduct of abstinence and be faithful messages to out of school youths from groups in 3 communities

### 1 Prevention

### 1.1 Community Outreach

### **Face to face counseling**

This activity was conducted by two full time counselors, two part time counselors and one volunteer counselor at the Crisis Service Centre on Homestretch Avenue during the hours of 8:00 am to 4:00 pm, Monday to Friday. The delivery of HIV prevention and appropriate BCC messages was done on a one-to-one basis with clients. The total numbers of persons newly reached with the following messages were:

- Messages that promote Abstinence only (A) 13 females
- Messages that promote faithfulness only (B) 1 male and 25 females
- Messages that promote both Abstinence and Faithfulness (A&B) 2 females

- Messages that promote behavior change beyond Abstinence & faithfulness (partner reduction, condom use, HIV Testing) - 9 males and 25 females

The number of persons previously reached through one-off outreach intervention using appropriate prevention messages was as follows:

- Messages that promote Abstinence only (A) 15 females
- Messages that promote Faithfulness only (B) 3 males and 11 females
- Messages that promote both A & B-1 female
- Messages that promote behavior change beyond Abstinence and Faithfulness (partner reduction, condom use, HIV testing etc) 1 male and 11 females

Our overall clientele data shows the numbers of clients who accessed the services of Help & Shelter in December 2008 under the following categories as follows:

- New clients -70
- Repeat clients 85
- **-** Hotline − 32
- Court support 54 attendances
- Client referrals 52
- Non-client referrals 27

# Client's questionnaire analysis

- 1. 46 forms were filled and returned after receiving face-to-face counseling during the month of November. Thirty-four clients or seventy-four percent (34 or 74%) rated the counseling received as very good and twelve clients or twenty-six percent (12 or 26%) rated the counseling as good.
- 2. Interest in returning for follow up sessions forty-five clients or ninety-eight percent (45 or 98%) said they would return for follow-up sessions. one client or two percent (1 or 2%) said they would not return for follow up sessions.

## **Hotline counseling**

During November 2008 the hotline service was activated during the evenings and weekends to one of the hotline counselors. Another hotline counselor worked at the Crisis Service Centre during the week from Monday to Friday, 9 am to 4 pm. The other counselors (full-time and part-time) while in office would accommodate hotline calls when they are not engaged with clients. 32 persons accessed this service seeking redress to their problems during the month.

### **Court Support and Counseling (in school vouth)**

There are two court support counselors who would attend the courts in Region 4 and these include Providence on the East Bank, Mahaica, Cove & John, Vigilance, Sparendam, on the East Coast and all the courts in Georgetown. For the month of November the counselors attended courts on 54 occasions with clients who are mostly children who have been sexually molested, rape or other-wise abused. Moral support is also given to women who have applied for protection orders under the Domestic Violence Act. Help & Shelter has a legal consultant who would assist in the application of this process.

### 1.2 A & B Prevention Program

**In-school youth – Prevention A** - Kingston Community High School - the Prevention Coordinator and two Prevention officers conducted 4 sessions with 7 boys and 11 girls on Fridays from 11am to midday. The topics covered were as listed below from the ISY manual:

- Building Healthy Relationships
- Three C's to Good Decision Making
- Looking at My Life, Past and Present
- Force, Fear and Resistance (DVD)

**In-School Youth – Prevention A** - St. John's College - the Prevention Coordinator and two Prevention officers conducted 3 sessions with 9 boys and 24 girls The topics covered were as listed below from the ISY manual:

- Building Healthy Relationships
- Three C's to Good Decision Making
- Looking at My Life, Past and Present

**Out-of-School Youth – Prevention A & B** – Grove Craft Centre – the Prevention Coordinator conducted 6 sessions with 20 girls covering the topics listed below;

- What Do I Really Want?
- Values and Behaviours and other A&B messages as per curriculum.

Planning meetings every Tuesday fortnight, directors' meeting on the third Thursday of the month and supervisory counselors' meeting on the first Wednesday of the month were conducted as planned.

Contract fees were paid to staff with all other accounting activities conducted including acquittals (done in December 2008 by a CSDS officer).

### II. CONSTRAINTS

The ISY program with Cummings Lodge Secondary school was not done for this term since the Head master informed Help & Shelter that he did not received permission from the Ministry of Education to do

the program. We are now in possession of a faxed copy of the letter that was sent to the ministry for the purpose of delivering same to the headmaster of the school.

Help & Shelter is experiencing some challenges as to the out of school youth program with the West Ruimveldt group that is managed through the Ministry of Culture, Youth and Sports. We are informed after the negotiation process that work with the group will commence in January 2009. There was a change with the Meadow Brook group to the Youth Vision group in Sophia and work with this group is to commence on the 11<sup>th</sup> December 2008.

As mentioned before the hotline training is rescheduled for sometime in January 2009 due to a few participants who had shown an interest in this area. At the moment there are only two hotline volunteers available to conduct this activity –one who works from the office and the other who work during the evenings and weekends. With this limited resource Help & Shelter try to maintain a 24 hours hotline service to the general populace.
